



The Cashmere Historic Museum was opened in 1958 and it is divided into two parts. There is the museum and the pioneer village, a living history museum. In the museum there are shown real artifacts of the Native Americans and the first settlers. You can see how the Native Americans hunted, what arms they used, their land, their jewelry, their clothes, maps and pictures of real Native Americans who lived there. The pioneer village is an authentic copy of a little village with a few huts the pioneers had built to live in. There are twenty houses and you can see different cabins and shops from the time of the settlers. The cabins are like real exsisting houses, but you are not allowed to go in. If you want, you can get an audio guide for the museum and the village.
