
## **Pike Place Market**

Seattle, Washington




## Facts:

Pike Place Market is located in Seattle in the northwest corner of Seattle's central business district. Pike Place Market is famous for its big fish and vegetable stalls, but you can buy nearly everything there. From books to CDs to souvenirs. Before the market was built in 1907 local Seattle area farmers sold their goods there. In 1907 a council ordinance vote made Pike Place a market.
